



THE HEBREW SCRIPTURES

Genesis 50:15-21

The reading is introduced.

A reading from the book of Genesis.

Pondering their father's death, Joseph's brothers said, "What if Joseph is angry with us and repays us for all the wrong we did him?" So they approached Joseph, saying: "Before Jacob died he said to us, 'You must say to Joseph: I beg you, please forgive your brothers their crime and their sin and all the wrong they did you.' Now therefore, we ask you, forgive the crime of us who are faithful to the God of your parents." Joseph wept when he heard this. Then the brothers wept also, and fell down before him, saying, "We present ourselves before you, as your attendants."

Joseph replied, "Don't be afraid; is it for me to put myself in God's place? You planned evil for me, but God planned it for the good, as it has come to pass this day—to bring about the survival of many people. So you need not be afraid. I myself will provide for you and your little ones." In this manner he assured them with words that touched their hearts.

PSALM 103:8–13 Benedic, anima mea

THE CHRISTIAN SCRIPTURES Romans 14:1–12

The reading is introduced.

A reading from Paul's letter to the Romans.

Welcome those whose faith is weak, and don't argue with them. The opinions of people range from those who believe they may eat any sort of meat, to those whose faith is so weak they eat only vegetables. Those who eat everything must not despise those who abstain. The ones who abstain must not pass judgment on those who eat, for God has welcomed them. Who are you to judge someone else's worker? It's for the employer to decide if the worker has succeeded or failed—and the worker will succeed, for our God has the power to make it so. One person considers one day more sacred than another, another considers all days equally sacred—and both are equally certain of their own opinions. The person who observes special days does it for our God. Whoever eats meat does it for our God and gives thanks to God. Whoever abstains does it for our God and gives thanks to God.

We don't live for ourselves, nor do we die for ourselves. While we live, we live for Christ Jesus, and when we die, we die for Christ Jesus. Both in life and in death we belong to Christ. That's why Christ died and came to life again—in order to reign supreme over both the living and the dead.

But you, how can you sit in judgment of your siblings? Or you, how can you look down on your siblings? We will all have to appear before the judgment seat of God. Scripture says, "'As surely as I live'—it is our God who speaks—'every knee will bend before me and every tongue will give praise to God." We will all have to give an account of ourselves before God.

THE GOSPEL READING Matthew 18:21–35

The Gospel reading is announced. A reading from the Gospel of Matthew.

Peter came up and asked Jesus, "When a sibling wrongs me, how many times must I forgive? Seven times?"

"No," Jesus replied, "not seven times; I tell you seventy times seven. And here's why.

"The kingdom of heaven is like a ruler who decided to settle accounts with the royal officials. When the audit was begun, one was brought in who owed tens of millions of dollars. As the debtor had no way of paying, the ruler ordered this official to be sold, along with family and property, in payment of the debt.

"At this, the official bowed down in homage and said, 'I beg you, your highness, be patient with me and I will pay you back in full!' Moved with pity, the ruler let the official go and wrote off the debt.

"Then that same official went out and met a colleague who owed the official twenty dollars. The official seized and throttled this debtor with the demand, 'Pay back what you owe me!'

"The debtor dropped to the ground and began to plead, 'Just give me time and I will pay you back in full!' But the official would hear none of it, and instead had the colleague put in debtor's prison until the money was paid.

"When the other officials saw what had happened, they were deeply grieved and went to the ruler, reporting the entire incident. The ruler sent for the official and said, 'You worthless wretch! I canceled your entire debt when you pleaded with me. Should you not have dealt mercifully with your colleague, as I dealt with you?' Then in anger, the ruler handed the official over to be tortured until the debt had been paid in full.

"My Abba in heaven will treat you exactly the same way unless you truly forgive your sisters and brothers from your hearts."


It is our custom to hold hands during The Lord's Prayer. As Jesus has taught us, we pray those words that bind us together:



Jesus invites you to this Table. Come, eat and live.

Please sit. Jesus welcomed everyone to his table, and so we at St. Barnabas welcome everyone to this table. Gather around the Altar as you are directed. You may stand or kneel as is your custom. The Celebrant will place the gluten-free bread into your hand. You have two options to receive the wine. A Chalice Bearer will offer the Common Cup from which you may drink, or you may dip the bread in the wine when a second chalice comes in turn. You may also choose not to partake of the Cup. When you have received the Sacrament, please return to your seat. If you or your children prefer only to receive a blessing, please indicate this by crossing your hands over your chest.

THE SENDING OUT OF EUCHARISTIC VISITORS (Occasional)


John Graves, in the name of this congregation, I send you forth bearing these holy gifts that those to whom you go may share with us the communion of Christ's Body and Blood.
