Please stand in body or spirit and face the Baptismal Font.

THE RECEPTION OF THE BODY

With faith in Jesus Christ, we receive the remains of our brother, Roger, for burial. Let us pray with confidence to God, the Giver of life, that Roger will be raised to his place in the company of the saints.

Silence is kept.

Deliver your servant, Roger, O Sovereign Lord Christ, from all evil, and set him free from every bond, that he may feast with all your saints in light; where with your Abba and the Holy Spirit you live and reign, one God, forever and ever. **Amen**.

In Baptism, we are already God's children, but what we shall be has not yet been revealed. Yet we know that when Christ appears we shall be like him, for we shall see him as he is.

Holy water is then sprinkled on the urn, and a pall placed upon it.


Let us also pray for all who mourn, that they may cast their care on our loving God, know the faithfulness of their Redeemer, and find solace in the divine compassion.

THE HEBREW SCRIPTURES Lamentations 3:22–26, 31–33

The reading is introduced.

A reading from the Lamentations of Jeremiah.

The Lord's favor is not exhausted, nor has God's compassion failed. They rise up new each morning, so great is God's faithfulness. "The Lord is all I have," I cry. "So I will wait in patience."

The Most High is good to those who hope in God, to all who seek God's presence.

It is good to wait patiently for the Lord to set us free.

For the Lord will not reject them for ever. God may punish now, but will show compassion and the fullness of love. God does not willingly torment or punish any human being. A brief silence, then:

Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people.

PSALM 23 Dominus regit me

The psalm is prayed in unison.

O God, you are my shepherd; *
I shall not be in want.

THE CHRISTIAN SCRIPTURES | Corinthians 12:31—13:13

The reading is introduced.

A reading from Paul's first letter to the Corinthians.

Set your hearts on the greater gifts. But now I will show you the way which surpasses all the others.

Even if I can speak in all the tongues of the earth—and those of angels, too—but do not have love, I am just a noisy gong, a clanging cymbal. If I have the gift of prophecy such that I can comprehend all mysteries and all knowledge, or if I have faith great enough to move mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. If I give away everything I own to feed those poorer than I, then hand over my body to be burned, but do not have love, I gain nothing.

Love is patient; love is kind. Love is not jealous, it does not put on airs, and it is not snobbish; it is never rude or self-seeking; it is not prone to anger, nor does it brood over injuries. Love doesn't rejoice in what is

wrong, but rejoices in the truth. There is no limit to love's forbearance, to its trust, its hope, its power to endure. Love never fails.

There are, in the end, three things that last: faith, hope, and love. But the greatest of these is love.



THE AFFIRMATION OF FAITH

Let us confess our faith.

Silence for reflection.

God creates all things, renews all things, and celebrates all things. This we believe.

Earth is a sanctuary, a sacred planet filled with God's presence, a home for us to share with all creatures. This we believe.

God became incarnate, a part of Earth, like Adam, a human being called Jesus Christ, who lived and breathed and spoke among us, suffered and died on a cross for all human beings and for all creation. This we believe.

The risen Jesus is the Christ at the center of creation, reconciling all things to God, renewing all creation, and filling the cosmos. This we believe.

The Spirit renews life in creation, groans in empathy with a suffering creation, and waits with us for the rebirth of all creation. This we believe.

We believe that with Christ we will rise and with Christ we will celebrate a new creation.

THE PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE

It is our custom during the Prayers of the People to light a candle in prayer if one chooses. Candles are provided on both sides of the Altar for this purpose.

For our brother Roger, let us pray to our Lord Jesus Christ who said, "I am Resurrection and I am Life."

Silence is kept.

Loving God, your will for us is abundant life: receive Roger into the fullness of life in your presence. **Hear our prayer.**

You know the thoughts of our hearts and our search for faith: shed the brightness of your light on Roger, who also sought understanding.

Hear our prayer.

You are greater than all our ideas and images of you: draw Roger into the mystery of your being.

Hear our prayer.

We know you as perfect mercy and love: welcome Roger in the face of that love and mercy.

Hear our prayer.

We praise you as the giver of life: gather all who mourn into the hope of eternal life.

Hear our prayer.

The Church commends all who die to the care of Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit: and so we commend Roger to you, giving thanks for the gift of his life.

Hear our prayer.

Comfort us in our sorrows at the death of our sibling; let our faith be our consolation, and eternal life our hope.

Silence is kept.

Holy One, we pray to you for Roger, and for all those whom we love but see no longer. Grant to them eternal rest. Let light perpetual shine upon them. May his soul and the souls of all the departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. **Amen**.






The Celebrant continues

Holy and gracious God: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only-begotten One, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and maker of all.

Jesus stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his friends, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper Jesus took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:



The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith with thanksgiving.

Please sit. Jesus welcomed everyone to his table, and so we at St. Barnabas welcome everyone to this table. Gather around the Altar as you are directed. You may stand or kneel as is your custom. The Celebrant will place the gluten-free bread into your hand. You have two options to receive the wine. A Chalice Bearer will offer the Common Cup from which you may drink, or you may dip the bread in the wine when a second chalice comes in turn. You may also choose not to partake of the Cup. When you have received the Sacrament, please return to your seat. If you or your children prefer only to receive a blessing, please indicate this by crossing your hands over your chest.
