THE HEBREW SCRIPTURES Isaiah 5:1–7

The reading is introduced. A reading from the book of the prophet Isaiah.

Let me now sing of my friend it is a love song about a vineyard. My friend had a vineyard on a fertile hillside.

My friend dug the soil, cleared the stones, and planted the choicest vines; then within it built a watchtower, and constructed a winepress.

My friend anticipated the crop of grapes, but what it yielded was rotten grapes.

"Now, inhabitants of Jerusalem and people of Judah judge between me and my vineyard:

What more could I have done for my vineyard that I haven't done? Why, when I looked for the crop of grapes, did it bring forth bad fruit?

Now I will let you know what I mean to do to my vineyard: take away its hedge, give it over to grazing, break through its wall, let it be trampled!

I will let it go to wilderness; it will not be pruned or hoed, but overgrown with thorns and briars. I will command the clouds not to send rain upon it." The vineyard of the YHWH Omnipotent is the house of Israel and the people of Judah are God's cherished vine. YHWH looked for justice, but found bloodshed; for righteousness, but found only a cry of suffering.

PSALM 80:7–15 *Qui regis Israel The psalm is prayed in unison.*

Restore us, O God of hosts; * show the light of your countenance, and we shall be saved.

You have brought a vine out of Egypt; * you cast out the nations and planted it.

You prepared the ground for it; * it took root and filled the land.

The mountains were covered by its shadow * and the towering cedar trees by its boughs.

You stretched out its tendrils to the Sea * and its branches to the River.

Why have you broken down its wall, * so that all who pass by pluck off its grapes?

The wild boar of the forest has ravaged it, * and the beasts of the field have grazed upon it.

Turn now, O God of hosts, look down from heaven; behold and tend this vine: * preserve what your right hand has planted.

They burn it with fire like rubbish; * at the rebuke of your countenance let them perish.

Glory to God, Source of All Being, Incarnate Word and Holy Spirit; * as it was in the beginning, is now, and will be for ever. Amen.

THE CHRISTIAN SCRIPTURES

Philippians 3:4b–14

The reading is introduced. A reading from Paul's letter to the Philippians.

Continue, my dear ones, to stand firm in Christ Jesus.

I implore Euodia and Syntyche to come to an agreement with each other in Christ. And I ask you, Syzygus, to be a true comrade and help these coworkers. These two women struggled at my side in defending the Good News, along with Clement and the others who worked with me. Their names are written in the Book of Life.

Rejoice in the Savior always! I say it again: Rejoice! Let everyone see your forbearing spirit. Our Savior is near. Dismiss all anxiety from your minds; instead, present your needs to God through prayer and petition, giving thanks for all circumstances. Then God's own peace, which is beyond all understanding, will stand guard over your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus.

Finally, my dear ones, your thoughts should be wholly directed to all that is true, all that deserves respect, all that is honest, pure, decent, admirable, virtuous or worthy of praise. Live according to what you have learned and accepted, what you have heard me say and seen me do. Then will the God of peace be with you.

It gave me great joy in our God that your concern for me bore fruit once more. You had been concerned all along, of course, but lacked the opportunity to show it. I don't say this because I am in need, for whatever the situation I find myself in, I have learned to be self-sufficient. I know what it is to be brought low, and I know what it is to have plenty. I have learned the secret: whether on a full stomach or an empty one, in poverty or plenty, I can do all things through the One who gives me strength.

Still, it was kind of you to want to share in my hardships.

THE HOLY GOSPEL Matthew 21:33–46

The Holy Gospel is announced. The Holy Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew. **Glory to you, O Christ.**

[Jesus said] "Listen to another parable. There was a property owner who planted a vineyard, put a hedge around it, installed a winepress and erected a tower. Then the owner leased it out to tenant farmers and went on a journey.

"When vintage time arrived, the owner sent aides to the tenants to divide the shares of the grapes. The

tenants responded by seizing the aides. They beat one, killed another and stoned a third. A second time the owner sent even more aides than before, but they treated them the same way. Finally, the owner sent the family heir to them, thinking, 'They will respect my heir.'"

"When the vine growers saw the heir, they said to one another, 'Here's the one who stands in the way of our having everything. With a single act of murder we could seize the inheritance.' With that, they grabbed and killed the heir outside the vineyard. What do you suppose the owner of the vineyard will do to those tenants?"

They replied, "The owner will bring that wicked crowd to a horrible death and lease the vineyard out to others, who will see to it that there are grapes for the proprietor at vintage time."

Jesus said to them, "Did you ever read in the scriptures, "The stone which the builders rejected has become the chief cornerstone; it was our God 's doing and we find it marvelous to behold'?

"That's why I tell you that the realm of God will be taken from you and given to people who will bear its fruit. Those who fall on this stone will be dashed to pieces, and those on whom it falls will be smashed."

When the chief priests and the Pharisees heard these parables, they realized that Jesus was speaking about them. Although they sought to arrest him, they feared the crowds, who regarded Jesus as a prophet.

(*Pause*) Draw them close to you and soothe them with the promise of your enduring love. Hear us, O God.

Your mercy is great.

We remember our beloved dead, who with the great cloud of witnesses bear witness to your saving grace; especially Roger, Gabrielle, Dale, Joyce, Elizabeth, and those we name aloud or in silence. (*Pause*) Accompany us on our pilgrimage of faith, that we too place our hope and trust in you. Hear us, O God. **Your mercy is great.**

We entrust these and all our prayers to you, Holy God, in the Name of your beloved Child, Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen**.





The Celebrant continues

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in Jesus Christ, the Word made flesh. For in these last days you sent Jesus to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In Christ, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In Christ, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."








The Invitation to Communion**

Jesus invites you to this Table. Come, eat and live.

Please sit. Jesus welcomed everyone to his table, and so we at St. Barnabas welcome everyone to this table. Gather around the Altar as you are directed. You may stand or kneel as is your custom. The Celebrant will place the gluten-free bread into your hand. You have two options to receive the wine. A Chalice Bearer will offer the Common Cup from which you may drink, or you may dip the bread in the wine when a second chalice comes in turn. You may also choose not to partake of the Cup. When you have received the Sacrament, please return to your seat. If you or your children prefer only to receive a blessing, please indicate this by crossing your hands over your chest.

ANNUAL GIVING CAMPAIGN 2023

The theme of this year's Annual Giving Campaign, *Responding in Gratitude*, invites all of us in the St. Barnabas community to reflect on our diverse
