THE LIGHTING OF THE ADVENT WREATH (5:00 pm)

In a dimly-lit church. A bell tolls and the Advent Wreath is lit.

Reader One: Because injustice and despair threaten to overwhelm us, we pray for hope...

One candle is lit in the Advent wreath.

Reader Two: Because so many swords have not yet been remade into plowshares, we pray for peace...

Two candles are lit in the Advent wreath.

Reader One: Because grief and loss weigh so heavily, we pray for joy...

Three candles are lit in the Advent wreath.

Reader Two: Because hatred is still so strong, and because people all over the world are suffering, we pray for love.

Five candles are lit in the Advent wreath.

Reader One: God has come to us as a child, to dwell with us, and to walk with us.

The Christ Candle is lit in the Advent wreath.

Reader Two: May the light and the fire from these candles burn away whatever would prevent the God of hope and peace and joy and love from being born among us.

Reader One: Friends, be not afraid, even now—even now—the light of Christ is illuminating the world, on earth as it is in heaven!

THE CHRISTMAS PROCLAMATION (8:00 pm)


In a dimly-lit church. A bell tolls and the Christmas Proclamation is read.

Many ages after God created the heavens and the earth, when man and woman were formed in God's own image; long after the great flood, when God set the rainbow in the clouds as a sign of the covenant; twenty-one centuries from the time of Abraham and Sarah; thirteen centuries after Moses led God's people to freedom, eleven centuries from the time of Ruth and the judges; a thousand years from the anointing of David as king; in the sixty-fifth week as Daniel's prophesy takes note; in the one hundred ninety-fourth Olympiad; the seven hundred fifty-second year from the founding of Rome; in the forty-second year of the reign of Octavian Augustus; in the sixth age of the world, all the earth being at peace, Jesus Christ, eternal Son of God, Son of the eternal Father, willing to hallow the world by his coming in mercy, was born of the virgin Mary in Bethlehem of Judea. Today is the birth of our Lord Jesus Christ, God made flesh.

The Liturgy of the Word

THE HEBREW SCRIPTURES Isaiah 9:2–7

This poem promises deliverance from Assyrian oppression, a hope based on the birth of a royal child with a name full of promise. While Judah's king will practice justice and righteousness, the real basis for faith lies in God's passion for the people: The zeal of the Lord of hosts will do this!**

The reading is introduced: A reading from the prophet Isaiah.

The people walking in darkness are seeing a brilliant light upon those who dwell in a land of deep shadows light is shining!

God, you have made the nation greater you have brought them abundant joy! They celebrate in your presence as with the harvest celebrations, or as warriors celebrate when dividing spoils.

For the yoke that burdened them, the weight on their shoulders, the rod of their oppressors you have shattered it, as you did at the defeat of Midian.

For every boot that tramped in battle, every cloak that was dragged through blood, is now used as fuel for the fire.

For a child is born to us, an heir is given us, upon whose shoulders dominion will rest. This One shall be called Wonderful Counselor, the Strength of God, Eternal Protector, Champion of Peace.

This dominion, and this peace, will grow without end, with David's throne and realm sustained with justice and fairness, now and forever. The zeal of YHWH Omnipotent will accomplish it!"

PSALM 96 Cantate Domino

The cantor sings the first verse of the psalm and the congregation joins in on verse two.

Let the heavens rejoice, and let the earth be glad; let the sea thunder and all that ' is in it; * let the field be joyful and / all that is ' therein.

Then shall all the trees of the wood shout for joy before God, ' who will come, * who will come / to judge the ' earth.

God will judge the world with ' righteousness * and the / peoples with ' truth.

Glory to God, Source of All Being, Incarnate Word ' and Holy Spirit; * as it was in the beginning, is now, and will be / for ever. ' Amen.

THE CHRISTIAN SCRIPTURES Titus 2:11–14

The appearance of God's grace in Jesus Christ brings salvation for all humanity. Consequently, in the present we live wisely and justly while also anticipating the hope of our Savior's final appearance.**

The reading is introduced. A reading from the letter of Titus.

The grace of God has appeared, offering salvation to all. It trains us to reject godless ways and worldly

desires, and to live temperately, justly and devoutly in this age as we await our blessed hope—the appearing of the glory of our great God and our Savior Jesus Christ. It was Christ who was sacrificed for us, to redeem us from all unrighteousness and to cleanse a people to be Christ's own, eager to do what is right.

THE HOLY GOSPEL Luke 2:1–20

God's greatest gift comes as a baby in a manger. Angels announce the "good news of great joy" and proclaim God's blessing of peace.**

The Holy Gospel is introduced.

The Holy Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ, according to Luke. **Glory to you, O Christ.**

In those days, Caesar Augustus published a decree ordering a census of the whole Roman world. This first census took place while Quirinius was governor of Syria. All the people were instructed to go back to the towns of their birth to register. And so Joseph went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to "the city of David"—Bethlehem, in Judea, because Joseph was of the house and lineage of David; he went to register with m ary, his espoused wife, who was pregnant.

While they were there, the time came for her delivery. She gave birth to her firstborn, a son; she put him in a simple cloth wrapped like a receiving blanket, and laid him in a feeding trough for cattle, because there was no room for them at the inn.

There were shepherds in the area living in the fields and keeping night watch by turns over their flock. The angel of God appeared to them, and the glory of God shone around them; they were very much afraid.

The angel said to them, "You have nothing to fear! I come to proclaim good news to you—news of a great joy to be shared by the whole people. Today in David's city, a savior—the Messiah—has been born to you. Let this be a sign to you: you'll find an infant wrapped in a simple cloth, lying in a manger."

Suddenly, there was a multitude of the heavenly host with the angel, praising God and saying, "Glory to God in high heaven! And on earth, peace to those on whom God's favor rests."

When the angels had returned to heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let's go straight to Bethlehem and see this event that God has made known to us." They hurried and found Mary and Joseph, and the baby lying in the manger; once they saw this, they reported what they had been told concerning the child. All who heard about it were astonished at the report given by the shepherds. Mary treasured all these things and reflected on them in her heart. The shepherds went away glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, just as they had been told.

Your mercy is great.






The Preface and Proper Preface

The Celebrant continues

Glory and honor and praise to you, holy and living God. To deliver us from the power of sin and death and to reveal the riches of your grace, you looked with favor upon Mary, your willing servant, that she might conceive and bear a son, Jesus, the holy child of God.

Living among us, Jesus loved us. He broke bread with outcasts and sinners, healed the sick, and proclaimed good news to the poor. He yearned to draw all the world to himself yet we were heedless of his call to walk in love. Then, the time came for him to complete upon the cross the sacrifice of his life, and to be glorified by you.




Through Christ and with Christ and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, to you be honor, glory and praise, for ever and ever. **Amen**.


