## THE HEBREW SCRIPTURES

## Jeremiah 31:31–34

The Judeans in Babylon blamed their exile on their ancestors, who had broken the covenant established at Sinai. Here the prophet looks to a day when God will make a new covenant with the people. There will be no need to teach the law because God will write it on their hearts.

*The reading is introduced.* A reading from the book of the prophet Jeremiah.

"Behold, the days are coming, says YHWH, when I will establish a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. It will not be like the covenant I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them up out of the land of Egypt—a covenant they broke, though I was their spouse, says YHWH. But this is the covenant I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says YHWH: I will put my Law in their minds and on their hearts. I will be their God, and they will be my people.

"No longer will they need to teach one another or remind one another to listen to YHWH. All of them, high and low alike, will listen to me, says YHWH, for I will forgive their misdeeds and will remember their sins no more.

# PSALM 51:1–13 Miserere mei, Deus

The psalm is prayed in unison.

Have mercy on me, O God, according to your loving kindness; \* in your great compassion blot out my offenses.

Wash me through and through from my wickedness, \* and cleanse me from my sin.

For I know my transgressions, \* and my sin is ever before me.

Against you only have I sinned \* and done what is evil in your sight.

And so you are justified when you speak \* and upright in your judgment.

Indeed, I have been wicked from my birth, \* a sinner from my mother's womb.

For behold, you look for truth deep within me \* and will make me understand wisdom secretly.

Purge me from my sin, and I shall be pure; \* wash me, and I shall be clean indeed.

Make me hear of joy and gladness, \* that the body you have broken may rejoice.

Hide your face from my sins, \* and blot out all my iniquities.

Create in me a clean heart, O God, \* and renew a right spirit within me.

Cast me not away from your presence, \* and take not your holy Spirit from me.

Give me the joy of your saving help again, \* and sustain me with your bountiful Spirit.

Glory to God, Source of All Being, Incarnate Word and Holy Spirit; \* as it was in the beginning, is now, and will be for ever. Amen.

## THE CHRISTIAN SCRIPTURES Hebrews 5:5–10

Using priestly imagery and references to the Hebrew Scriptures, the author explains how Christ lived in trusting obedience to God, and so God has made Christ the source of our eternal salvation.

*The reading is introduced.* A reading from the letter to the Hebrews.


Even Christ didn't presume to take on the office of high priest. Christ was appointed high priest by the One who said,

"You are my Own; today I have begotten you"; and in another place, "You are a priest forever, according to the order of Melchizedek."

In the days when he was in the flesh, Jesus offered prayers and supplications with loud cries and tears to God, who was able to save him from death, and Jesus was heard because of his reverence. Firstborn though he was, Jesus learned to obey through suffering. But having been made perfect, Jesus became, for all who obey, the source of eternal salvation, and he was designated by God to be a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.

# THE HOLY GOSPEL John 12:20–33

Jesus entered Jerusalem for the last time to celebrate the Passover festival. Here Jesus' words about seeds planted in the ground turn the disaster of his death into the promise of a harvest in which everyone will be gathered.

*The Holy Gospel is announced.* The Holy Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ according to John. **Glory to you, O Christ.** 

Among those who had come up to worship at the Passover festival were some Greeks. They approached Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and put forth this request: "Please, we would like to see Jesus." Philip went to tell Andrew, and together the two went to tell Jesus.

Jesus replied,

"Now the hour has come for the Chosen One to be glorified. The truth of the matter is, unless a grain of wheat falls on the ground and dies, it remains only a single grain; but if it dies, it yields a rich harvest.

"If you love your life you'll lose it; if you hate your life in this world you'll keep it for eternal life. "Anyone who wants to work for me must follow in my footsteps, and wherever I am, my worker will be there too. Anyone who works for me will be honored by Abba God.

"Now my soul is troubled. What will I say: 'Abba, save me from this hour?' But it was for this very reason that I have come to this hour.

"Abba, glorify your name!"

A voice came from heaven:

"I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again."

The crowds that stood nearby heard this and said it was a clap of thunder; others said, "It was an angel speaking."

Jesus answered,

"It was not for my sake that this voice came, but for yours.

"Sentence is now being passed on this world; now the ruler of this world will be overthrown.

"And when I am lifted up from this earth, I will draw all people to myself."

By these words Jesus indicated the kind of death he would die.

## THE GREAT THANKSGIVING



#### The Celebrant continues

Holy and gracious God: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only-begotten One, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and maker of all.

Jesus stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his friends, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper Jesus took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Celebrant and People Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, Almighty God, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling Christ's death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.



Please sit. Jesus welcomed everyone to his table, and so we at St. Barnabas welcome everyone to this table. Gather around the Altar as you are directed. You may stand or kneel as is your custom. The Celebrant will place the gluten-free bread into your hand. You have two options to receive the wine. A Chalice Bearer will offer the Common Cup from which you may drink, or you may dip the bread in the wine when a second chalice comes in turn. You may also choose not to partake of the Cup. When you have received the Sacrament, please return to your seat. If you or your children prefer only to receive a blessing, please indicate this by crossing your hands over your chest.

#### We are grateful.


